INTERNAL RULES



Room conditions of use:

Please turn off the air conditioning and lighting when you leave your room.

Any valuables must be deposited in Handioasis' chest. Handioasis declines all responsibility in case of theft.

Be careful not to flush anything down the toilet, as there are bins available in the bathrooms.

Respect the calm to respect the sleep of others.

Smoking is not allowed in the rooms and in the common areas.

We ask that you do not use towels outside the room, pool towels are available for rent.

Breakfasts are served between 8:30 and 11:00, lunch from 12:30 to 14:00 and dinner from 19:30 to 21:00 in the place of your choice.

The room must be vacated by noon on the day of departure.

Pool Terms of Use

Children may use the swimming pool provided that they are accompanied and supervised by their parents or any person delegated by them, with the exception of Handioasis staff. People with contagious diseases or skin problems are strictly forbidden to use the swimming pool.

It is forbidden:

To walk in shoes in the pool area.

To eat by the pool.

Use soap or any other similar product in the pond.

Terms of use of the Terrace

It is forbidden for people in manual wheelchairs to go up and down the access ramp without first requesting the help of the Handioasis staff (use the bell).

Child Supervision

Parents or any accompanying person delegated or mandated by the parents are exclusively responsible for the supervision of the children during the entire stay at the Handioasis establishment as well as during activities or excursions.

Meals, Shuttle, Taxi:

We ask you to notify us no later than 2 p.m. to book meals and your needs for the next day's shuttle and taxi. Any meals ordered will be charged.

In the event of non-compliance with some of these rules, which may be detrimental either to the safety of people and the establishment or to other Handioasis customers, the site manager and the YOOLA agency may decide to take sanctions up to and including exclusion from the establishment without reimbursement of the stay.

CHECK-IN / CHECK-OUT

On the day of arrival, rooms are available from 3 p.m. On the day of departure you must vacate your rooms by 10 a.m. at the latest.

BREAKFAST AND MEALS

Breakfast is served from 8:30 am to 10:30 am, lunch is served from 12:30 pm to 1:30 pm. Dinner is served from 7:30 pm.

CLEANING

Cleaning is carried out every day from 9am in the rooms, if you have booked an apartment the cleaning will also be carried out every morning in the apartments.

TRANSFERS

The airport transfer service is a paid service that we charge at a flat rate of 100€ round trip.

TIME DIFFERENCE

Portugal has a one-hour time difference with France. Thus, when it is 12:00 in Paris, it is 11:00 in Lisbon. Note: Portugal changes time like France in winter and summer.

FORMALITIES

Identity card or passport for European Union nationals. For other nationalities, check with the consulate or embassy.

If you are travelling with your children: minors, regardless of age, must also have an identity document or individual passport. A minor travelling alone does not need an exit permit if he or she has an individual passport, but with a simple identity card, he or she must also have an exit permit.

ELECTRICITY

220 volts. The plugs are identical to the French plugs. Adapter and transformer are therefore not necessary.

TELEPHONE

To call Morocco (landline) from France, dial 00 + 351 +the number of your correspondent in 8 digits (without the initial 0). To call a mobile phone: 00 + 351 +the number of your correspondent in 8 digits (without the initial 0). To call France from Portugal, dial 00 + 33 +the number of your correspondent (without the initial 0).

MONEY

The national currency is the Euro. Payment by card is accepted in most shops.

MEMORABILIA

Local souvenirs are often delicacies such as pasteis, wine, cheeses and other Portuguese specialties. If you want to come back with gourmet souvenirs, remember to take a piece of luggage and an insulated bag for safe transport.

HEALTH (European emergency number: 112)

In case of emergency, the new hospital in Sintra has an emergency department with all specialties. Many doctors speak French.

SWIMMING POOL

Handioasis Portugal offers its guests two swimming pools, a pool on the apartment side, with a shallow depth, and a second pool on the garden side a little deeper. Each pool has a Handimove arm. The use of the swimming pool is possible from 10 am to 9 pm. Swimming is not supervised. Towels are not provided for the pool.

From Sintra you can discover the entire Lisbon region and its neighborhoods. Handioasis offers excursions, guided tours and tickets to the main sights.

While Lisbon is famous, Cascais is also a small seaside resort that is popular with locals and tourists alike. Just like Estoril and its beaches, the Portuguese coasts are very lively, you can enjoy many events, festivals, sporting events such as the ATP tennis tournament in Estoril, the GP motorcycle grand prix in Estoril and for football fans, the Portuguese football championship and the European Cup in Lisbon.







The castles of Sintra are among the most fascinating treasures of Portugal, located in an enchanting setting combining history, architecture and spectacular natural landscapes. Sintra, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, is home to several iconic palaces and castles that attract visitors from all over the world. Here is an overview of the main castles to

Palais de Pena (Palácio Nacional da Pena) (Not wheelchair accessible)

Points forts:

Why visit?: It is the best-preserved royal palace in Portugal and a witness to royal

Convento dos Capuchos

Description: An austere Franciscan monastery, integrated into the surrounding nature. Characteristics:

Built in stone and cork, highlighting simplicity and humility. Small monastic cells and chapel.

A peaceful setting in the forest of Sintra.

Why visit? : To discover a spiritual place and appreciate its harmonious integration with nature.

Cabo da Roca, located about 40 km west of Lisbon, is the westernmost point of continental Europe. This spectacular site marks the meeting of the land and the Atlantic Ocean, offering breathtaking landscapes, soaring cliffs and a wild atmosphere that attracts many visitors

Kev features

A unique geographical position

Cabo da Roca is known as the "point where the land ends and the sea begins" (Onde a terra acaba e o mar começa), according to the Portuguese poet Luís de Camões. Located at an altitude of 140 meters, the headland offers impressive panoramic views of the Atlantic Ocean.

Le phare du Cabo da Roca

Built in 1772, this iconic lighthouse is one of the oldest in Portugal. It remains in operation and is a symbol of the country's maritime history.

Monument and certificate

A stele marks the exact point where Cabo da Roca is located, with coordinates engraved: 38°47 North, 9°30 West.

Visitors can purchase an official certificate attesting to their passage to the westernmost point of continental Europe.

Natural landscapes

The steep cliffs, covered in low vegetation and swept by the wind, provide the perfect setting for memorable photos.

Hiking trails allow you to explore the surrounding area, including the SintraCascais


Praça do Comércio is the heart of Lisbon near the Tagus River: arcaded palace, triumphal arch, statue, view of the castle that dominates the city

A visit to the Belem district is a must on a trip to Lisbon. You start your tour along the bank of the Tagus River and enjoy the centuries-old buildings, including the Mosteiro dos Jeronimos and the Padrao dos Descobrimentos

The Mosteiro dos Jeronimos is another great place to visit and totally accessible Admission is free for visitors with disabilities, and the building has accessible toilets.

The Jerónimos Monastery remains the must-see monument of the district The church and the lower cloister are accessible to people with disabilities.

The new Musée des Carosses is also accessible to all. Lifts and ramps provide access to all exhibition spaces and public areas.

The performance halls and auditoriums of the Belem Cultural Centre and the Berardo Collection Museum for modern art lovers are accessible to wheelchair users

The Maritime Museum and the Calouste Gulbenkian Planetarium have all the facilities to facilitate the visit of disabled people.

A Masterpiece of Manueline ArchitectureThe UNESCO World Heritage Site Jerónimos Monastery (Mosteiro dos Jerónimos) is one of Lisbon's most impressive landmarks and a symbol of Portugal's greatness in the 16th century. The National Carriage Museum (Museu Nacional dos Coches) is one of the most iconic museums in Lisbon, Portugal. It is renowned for its exceptional collection of carriages and other horse-drawn vehicles, which illustrate the evolution of the means of transport of the royal and aristocratic era.

The Sanctuary of Cristo Rei (or Santuário de Cristo Rei) is one of Portugal's most iconic landmarks, located in Almada, on the south bank of the Tagus River, opposite Lisbon. Inspired by Christ the Redeemer in Rio de Janeiro, this imposing statue is a symbol of faith, gratitude and peace for the Portuguese people.

History and meaning

The idea of building the shrine was born in 1934, during a visit by the Cardinal Patriarch of Lisbon to Rio de Janeiro. The inspiration comes from the statue of Christ the Redeemer in Brazil.

In 1940, Portugal, spared the ravages of the Second World War, decided to build the monument as a sign of gratitude. Inauguration: Construction began in 1949 and the monument was inaugurated on May 17, 1959.

Architecture and dimensions

Statue: The statue of Christ is 28 meters high and depicts Jesus Christ with open arms, blessing the city of Lisbon and Portugal. Pedestal: The pedestal measures 75 meters, bringing the total height to 113 meters.

Materials: The statue is made of reinforced concrete, and its simplicity reflects a modernist style.

Panoramic

The Sanctuary offers one of the best panoramic views of Lisbon, the Tagus River and the 25th of April Bridge.

An elevator takes you to the top of the pedestal, where a terrace offers a spectacular view.

It is a popular place to watch the sunset and capture memorable photos.

Religious significance

The Shrine is a place of Catholic pilgrimage, welcoming worshippers from all over the country and the world. A chapel is located at the base of the statue, providing a space for meditation and prayer.
